

In my sermon last Sunday, I named that April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month. During the sermon, I mentioned the alarming statistic that 77% of child abuse happens not from strangers, but by known caregivers to children (some sources site this as high as 93%). In fact, strangers are typically the person who winds up providing help to a victim. You can watch the full sermon on <u>YouTube</u> (at the 30:30 mark). As disciples of Jesus who declared, "let the children come," we are committed to making safe spaces for our children to thrive here at HOPE and also in their homes, schools, and communities. One way we can live into this dimension of our discipleship is to be aware of typical grooming process techniques and how to recognize them, as well as how to teach our children to recognize "tricky" people or "tricky" behavior in adults.

The Church is already uniquely positioned to facilitate this process. Church people have been enacting what the CDC calls "protective factors" since the first century. Protective factors include 1) offering material support in times of struggle. The church is giving people food and money and shelter and childcare. 2) social connection. The church at her best is functioning as extended family—celebrating and mourning with people through life events. You can see a full list of <u>Risk & Protective Factors for Child Abuse and Neglect and Violence Prevention</u> to familiarize yourself with warning signs and the ways we as Church embody a place of protection. You can also see areas of strength here in River Falls, as well as areas in which we could use some improvement. How might we, as disciples of Jesus, strive to increase the protective factors of both our church and wider community? Perhaps, one step would be to receive detailed training and make sure we establish a safe child policy here at HOPE.

Child advocacy centers across the country offer this kind of community training for free. Research from the nonprofit *Darkness to Light* which offers child abuse prevention trainings, estimates that when we can get 1 in 10 of the adult population trained in understanding the dynamics of child abuse, we will see a culture shift not unlike the shift from the days of tossing kids in the back of the station wagon to the standard use of car seats.

A faith community who is trained in child safety and abuse prevention is important, not only because faith is such an integral part of many abuse victim's lives, but because churches are intuitively doing what research says is best for people, and additional training can offer extra insight to help churches be savvy in recognizing tricky people, and protecting the vulnerable. When we can understand and recognize the grooming process, the tactics of tricky people, the red-flag boundary violations, we not only help keep kids safer by intervening to disrupt those patterns, we are also teaching and modeling for our children a right-relationship to self and others, which is such an integral part of being followers of Jesus.

Our eyes can be kept from seeing the difference between known tricky people and stranger helpers. But when we're equipped to recognize and understand those right relationships, learn that trust is built in increments over time via behaviors, we can come to see that sometimes, the stranger in our midst is Jesus. We have the unique gift, as disciples of Jesus, to *be Jesus* even for children who do not know us. 


