The summer months are rich with ministry memories for me. In recent weeks my social media feeds have reminded me of them. During the years I did full-time youth ministry, my summers were far from Sabbath moments. My suitcase always stayed halfway unpacked between Confirmation Camp, High School Retreats, Mission Trips, etc. As frantic as the summer months can sometimes feel for adults trying their best to make the most of these short months, I always witnessed that they were absolutely magical moments for young people.

Free from the obligations of constant school work or extracurriculars, our younger siblings find themselves with time to simply breathe. For those in a faith community this time is often some of the only moments where they can feel a deep connection with the divine. I can personally attest to the absolute divine holiness in the midst of a campfire. In the crispness of summer night air, with the expansiveness of the universe twinkling above, transfixed by the crackle of fire, the sweetness of marshmallows, and the giggles, whispers, and even occasional camp song harmony, God finds God's way in.

I often encounter adults who long for those kinds of summer ministry moments. Memories of feeling the Spirit in the midst of a hike, or a kayak ride, or gathered around a fire with dozens of others singing alleluias. We remember how we felt at that National Youth Gathering, or Bible camp, or how we were changed during a week of mission work. But, I still contend that summer offers a unique bit of holy ground, no matter how old we are...an invitation for each of us to remove our sandals, letting the sand or the grass tickle between our toes (Exodus 3:5). Whether we are 9, 19, 49, or 90, God is absolutely still at work in the midst of our lives.

As we linger in this precious time of summer- where there is still as much ahead as what has passed and the days are long and the evenings not too hot, I pray that you have time to encounter the Holy One- to tap back into that curious young person, to wonder where God is calling you next, to be surrounded in story and song with others who know and love Jesus too, and to have the youthful expectation that anything is possible. May it be yours.

I leave you with A Blessing For Evening by Rev. Meta Herrick Carlson, which inspired this post:

The crickets harmonize and dusk grows
casting shadows on today's best efforts.

Nature's call to worship persists.




Food Shelf at UWRF - The students who are working and doing research on campus this summer need some ongoing help with food.
