It is titled, "The Misunderstood Reason Millions of Americans Stopped Going to Church" and is an opinion piece by Jake Meador, the editor in chief of Mere Orthodoxy. His is not the first of such articles in recent years. Many scholars, theologians, and mildly popular christian writers have come from nearly every angle to address the conundrum of fewer people in the pews.

I have heard this concern from ministry colleagues, across generations, each with their own hypothesis as to what has gone "awry." I have also frequently heard it from many of you, as well as those in previous calls. Often our suggested solutions tend to err on the side of "doing church better."

"If we only invited more people..."

"If we had more contemporary music..."

"If we didn't say the Creed..."

"If we changed the worship time..."

"If the pastor didn't/did/would/would not preach about..."

When these are not the proposed solutions, we often fall back on criticism and judgment:

"These young parents just need to make a better effort, like I did"

"No one will step up to help out"

"What's wrong with people that they don't think church is important?"

"Well, if we had new leadership"

"If we just did it well, like we *used* to..."

And yet, none of these questions, judgements, or frameworks seem to be giving us a plan for moving forward. Do we even know the goal? Do we know why that is our goal?























Upcoming Celebration of Life



Proceeds support the 150+. year old church, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Check the Facebook page at Kinnickinnic











