

This Sunday marks the end of our Advent & Christmas season and our exploration of "How Does A Weary World Rejoice?" I pray it has offered you the gifts of hope, peace, joy, love, and resiliency in the midst of a world so often drenched in weariness.

As we gather this week we celebrate two important Feast Days of the Church Year! January 6th is Epiphany and January 7th is Baptism of Our Lord. Throughout Advent we have been engaged in Luke's narrative. On these days we typically explore Matthew and Mark's versions of the story. Luke omits the magi's visit and revelation of just who Jesus is, which Matthew so infamously recounts in his second chapter. Mark omits the entire birth narrative and jumps right into the heart of Jesus' ministry with the proclamation of John the Baptist and Jesus' baptism. In order to bring our Advent and Christmas seasons to their culmination, we will hear Luke's account of Jesus' baptism this week. The One whom Mary sang about, is here! The one to cast the mighty down from their thrones and uplift the humble of heart now emerges from the baptismal waters and God calls him *beloved*.

In Jesus' birth, death, and resurrection, you also have been adopted into that belovedness. No matter what, God looks at you, and calls **you** beloved, too. How do we, like the magi, live our lives in a way that reveals that kind of belovedness?

How do we reveal God's very presence in a weary world? How might we shine the love and light of Christ into our weary world?

As Advent and Christmas come to a close, a new season begins: Epiphany! Epiphany signifies the beginning of Jesus Christ's work of manifesting God. It testifies to the whole purpose of the incarnation, which is the manifestation of God in Jesus Christ beginning not just with his birth but especially with his baptism! (In fact, Christmas is a newer festival day, not appearing until about 336 CE). The mighty signs and teachings we discover in the Gospels tell the story of Jesus accomplishing this manifestation, which ultimately culminates in the final events in Jerusalem leading to his death and resurrection. We mark this particular season of time between Christmas and Lent by exploring this manifestation known as *Epiphany*.

May these next six weeks provide you a multitude of opportunities to experience Christ manifest in and through your life!


Baptism of the Lord | How does a weary world rejoice? We trust our belovedness




WINTER SESSION BEGINS JANUARY 10TH 2024! ALL ARE WELCOME

A Simpler, Humbler, and Bolder Church¹

Dear Members and Friends of the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin,

Philippians 2 Do nothing from selfish ambition or empty conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests but to the interests of others. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he existed in the form of God... emptied himself ...he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death— even death on a cross.

It is time for your congregation's annual meeting! This is a great opportunity to reflect on the past year of faithful ministry. Now is the time to ask the BIG questions! How were we faithful in in ministry? How were we faithful in participating in God's simple mission to love our neighbor? Now is the time to celebrate how God's Spirit has inspired your ministry! Give thanks to God and celebrate for the good that your congregation has accomplished!

Now is also the time to tell the truth about your ministry. How has your congregation fallen short and not been faithful to God's will? Lacked energy, a sense of purpose or mission? Now is the time to humbly tell the truth if your congregation has lost its focus or has little energy for God's work.

We all need to take an honest look in the rear view mirror of the last year and ask how have we been faithful and how have we failed to be faithful to our baptismal promises. Then we can boldly move into the New Year 2024 asking how we can with God's help do better.

The Church of England took a long look into the rear view mirror and with much prayer has discerned that moving forward they will strive to be a Simpler, Humbler and Bolder Church in the future. The Church of England described their vision for the future in this way:

Simpler, humbler, bolder are virtues we believe God is calling from us at this point in our history. They run through the vision and shape all we do and all that we are.

- Simpler because we are not as big a church as we used to be
- Humbler because we are facing our failures, and this is not easy.
- Bolder because the love of Christ compels us. We have a gospel to proclaim, and we live
 and minister in a world of much pain and confusion.

I believe these three virtues could also help us in the coming year. I invite your councils and leaders to lean into these questions in 2024:

- Simpler: How can we simplify our structure so more time and energy
 can be spent on loving our neighbors and joining in God's mission in our
 community? How can we focus on what is really important and let go of
 the trivial or unnecessary?
- 2. Humbler: What isn't working? How have we fallen short? We can't do everything we use to do so what ONE thing can we do for Jesus? How can we work with other churches, denominations in our community?
- 3. Bolder: How can your congregation be braver and bolder in sharing the good news about Jesus in a hurting world? In prophetic witness to justice issues in our world? In working for right relationships with our neighbors and all of creation?

I thank my God for every remembrance of you, always in every one of my prayers for all of you, praying with joy for your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work in you will continue to complete^[4] it until the day of Jesus Christ. Philippians 1:3-6

Friends, I am truly grateful for your partnership in the gospel and all the ways you are faithful in ministry. I invite you to move joyfully, simply, humbly and boldly into God's future in 2024. Bishop Laurie Skow-Anderson
