Wandering Heart Wonderings... From Pastor Annie Ladnier

Our poem for this week is titled, "Open Hands." As we reflect on Peter's journey of discipleship we remember our text from last Sunday when Peter is so fixed on the idea of who he *wants* Jesus to be, the kind of Messiah he *had hoped* Jesus was going to be- a victor over Rome. But Jesus' stand against Peter's human desires reiterates the vision and mission of God's Messiah which Jesus has come to fulfill. Jesus is fixed on this mission, one that will ultimately bring Resurrection life to all!

We, too, get fixated on the wrong things when it comes to who Jesus is and what He has come to do. Our faith today is likely not the same as it was when we were children, teenagers, or younger adults. As you've grown in faith you have likely had to let go of some misconceptions of who Jesus is. As you continue to grow in your faith, to grow more in tune with Jesus and His mission, you will likely have to let go of even more. As we grow as a congregation there are likely things Jesus is asking us to let go of in order to live more fully into Jesus' mission for us. As you reflect on this week's poem, think of what Jesus might be inviting you or our congregation to loosen a grip on. Read this poem as your prayer:

Wandering Heart: "I'm fixed upon it"

Open Hands

We are born with the ability to wrap our fingers around another, to hold tight to what we know. Maybe that's where the instinct comes fromthis clinging. this sinking, this holding on. Maybe that's why Peter cries, "Never!" when Jesus must leave. From the very beginning we've known how to hold tight. So I pray: open up my hands. Uncurl my fingers one by one. Loosen the grip that I hold unyielding. Remind me that birds must fly and children must grow and leaves must fall. And even though we are born with the ability to hold tight, we can learn how to love with open hands.

About this Series:

This Lent, we are focusing on the life and faith of one of Jesus' most famous disciples. In Peter, we see a person who is both steadfast and unsteady, a dear friend and a betrayer, a follower and a wanderer. In Peter, we often see ourselves. By following Peter's journey, we watch the story of Jesus unfold through the eyes of a very normal human trying to figure it all out—just like us.

In becoming familiar with Peter's story, many themes resonated with the hymn, "Come Thou Fount." It's as if Peter himself wrote this song. And so, for each step in Peter's journey, we will be guided by a phrase from this hymn. As we follow Peter's story, we will sing our way through Lent, binding our wandering hearts to God.

Through this series, we affirm that faith is a constant journey of steadfast pursuit, one that ebbs and flows. We affirm that wandering is exploration, not necessarily distance from God. We affirm the ways Peter keeps going: he drops his nets, he walks on water, he runs to the empty tomb, he swims to the shore to meet the risen Christ. He keeps searching and yearning and loving, even after missteps or mistakes. Ultimately, in Peter's story, we are reminded that God loves imperfect people—in fact, time and again, that's precisely who God claims and calls.

This Lent, we will look for ourselves in the stepping stones of Peter's story. We will reflect on the stages of our own faith journeys as well as who and what has shaped us along the way. As we wander, let us tune our hearts to sing God's grace. May we rest in streams of mercy, never ceasing.



Please Join Us! HOPE Community Book Read & Discussion


In 1452 Pope Nicholas V issued a decree that laid the foundation for the Doctrine of Discovery. His decree gave King Alfonso V of Portugal authority to enslave non-Christian peoples, thereby promoting his country's slave trade in West Africa. Successive papal decrees solidified and expanded the doctrine by granting Catholic nations of Europe the authority to declare dominion over the then-unknown non-Christian lands they encountered in the Age of Discovery. The decrees also encouraged enslaving native peoples ("Papal Bull Dum Diversas 18 June, 1452," doctrineofdiscovery.org).

In 2016, 19 ELCA synod assemblies passed a memorial that would charge the triennial ELCA Churchwide Assembly to consider repudiating the Doctrine of Discovery. With a vote of 912 to 28, the representative assembly adopted the memorial, making the ELCA the second major denomination in the United States to repudiate the Doctrine of Discovery.

On April 29, 2023, the following resolution was approved by the NW Synod of Wisconsin Assembly: "Be it resolved that each congregation take the small step to include a land acknowledgement in their bulletin and newsletter, and speak the words or a variation of these words: 'we gather today on the ancestral land of the (appropriate tribe or nation) and honor their elders past, present, and emerging" before every public gathering, including but not limited to, worship "'.

How are these three events connected, and what do they mean for us as people of HOPE Lutheran Church? Let us explore together to find out! Please join us for a HOPE community book read and discussion of "An Indigenous People's History of the United States" by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz. We have 18 copies of the book available for free for pick up on a first come-first serve basis beginning March 3. The first history of the United States told from the perspective of indigenous <u>peoples</u>



Today in the United States, there are more than five hundred federally recognized Indigenous nations comprising nearly three million people, descendants of the fifteen million Native people who once inhabited this land. The centuries-long genocidal program of the US settler-colonial regimen has largely been omitted from history. Now, for the first time, acclaimed historian and activist Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz offers a history of the United States told from the perspective of Indigenous peoples and reveals how Native Americans, for centuries, actively resisted expansion of the US empire.

"Origin narratives form the vital core of a people's unifying identity and of the values that guide them. In the United States, the founding and development of the Anglo-American settler-state involves a narrative about Puritan settlers who had a covenant with God to take the land. That part of the origin story is supported and reinforced by the Columbus myth and the 'Doctrine of Discovery." - Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz






The St. Croix Valley Habitat for Humanity Women's Build Week


Spring Session begins April 10th!
