

"What Does A Land Acknowledgement Have to Do with Our Mission?" A Weekly Reflection by Rev. Annie Ladnier

Beginning this Sunday, April 14th HOPE's Green Team is hosting a three week book discussion on *An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States* by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz. The discussion promises to be rich, eye-opening, and at times, challenging. It is also sure to plant seeds for further inquiry and discussion about the land which currently serves as our home here at HOPE. Why is such a conversation significant to undertake as a Christian congregation?

Scripture reminds us that seeking after truth is indeed costly: Buy truth, and do not sell it; buy wisdom, instruction, and understanding- Proverbs 23:23

The entirety of our scriptural witness shows us that we worship a God concerned with justice and liberation of God's people. When such justice and liberation is withheld from any of God's creation, it winds up killing both the oppressed and the oppressor. Withholding liberation from one another suffocates us all; it makes it impossible to breathe and live into the love God intends for us to have for one another.

But we are an Exodus people! We are Easter people! We are liberated and raised to new life! We confess that Jesus *came so that we may have life, and have it abundantly* (John 10:10). And that is a collective "we." It is so *all* may have life! And part of Resurrection living is that we do better than when we were on the road only to death. Part of Resurrection living is that we join God's pursuit of abundant life, even when we have to dig for it under layers of years of false "christian doctrine." Investigating the origins of the *doctrine of discovery* and *manifest destiny* reveal to us just how easily our faith can be twisted when it is tied to a hunger for property, power, and money misconstrued as "God's favor."

Seeking abundant life means that we hear, see, and learn from the voices of all of God's people and take a posture of curiosity about what more God might be trying to reveal to us through those voices. Zora Neale Hurston once said, "If you are silent about your pain, they'll kill you and say you enjoyed it." We should not demand this of those who have been hurt because of the misuse of trying to follow Jesus. We have not historically done it all that well. We have made grave mistakes throughout history. And God calls us to be better!

God implores us to wonder who was hurt? Who still hurts? What beautiful expressions of the divine did our ancestors trample on as they wrenched land and resources out of the hands of those already stewarding them? In the midst of multiple stories, where might God's truth be woven? Where is God calling us now? Who is God inviting us to become? What current and future pain does our God earnestly hope we avoid causing one another? Or do we think we have fully arrived?

No. For we sing, Jesus has arisen and we shall arise!

When siblings cry out in voices loud enough to finally be heard after years of being silenced, we are called to rise to the occasion of listening, wondering, celebrating their gifts, and hoping for a renewed future together. This month, God is nudging us to do that through a book study. God is nudging us to grow a new appreciation for a beautiful part of God's holy creation. I look forward to growing in God's nudging, together.

Did you know that UWRF now has their very own social worker on campus to assist over 30 students who are system impacted?

This means they may have been in foster care, relative care, or orphaned; have incarcerated parents, experienced mental health hospitalization, or some other type of system impact. <u>UWRF Falcon Links</u> aims to provide guidance, support, and resources to these students so they can get their basic needs met and be successful college students. Many of the Falcon Links students are first generation college students. They often fall below the poverty line, lack a support system, and cannot get their basic needs met. Falcon Links helps to get students resources such as housing over school breaks, employment, food, hygiene items, access and navigation of healthcare, mental health resources, dental care, eye care, and other resources! If students can't get their basic needs met, it becomes nearly impossible to be a successful student. Falcon Links helps make both happen. A few weeks ago, many of you came forward with generous gifts for a little boy, Breccan Olson, who was in the hospital with a severe GI infection that led to dialysis. Are you a sewer, quilter, or crafter with a fabric stash that needs downsizing?



HOPE SERVICE PROJECT NIGHT!




This spring we are focusing on "Faith in Daily Life" and we'll be learning about and experiencing different dimensions of our discipleship: April 10: Exploring different ways to pray
